

## General Academic Essay Outline

### Intro

This is your first paragraph. See our handout [Writing an Effective Introduction](#) for more.

#### 1. **Hook**

This is a statement to grab your reader's attention—like a quote or interesting fact about the topic of the paper.

#### 2. **Background information**

Introduce the topic and your argument. What does the reader need to know before diving into your paper? Everything mentioned in your topic sentences should be mentioned here.

#### 3. **Thesis statement**

This is the last sentence in your introduction. It is a narrow and focused thought. It is your opinion, or the lesson you want your reader to learn from your paper. It expresses your claim about the topic and the supporting points for your claim.

### Body Paragraphs

- Many body paragraphs in argument papers need more than a single point of evidence to support each main idea. Repeat this pattern as many times as it takes to provide your reader with all the information they need, to persuade your reader of your position, to fit the requirements of your paper, and to support your argument.

## Conclusion

Your conclusion should re-state your thesis, sum up the ideas you have explored, and put your thesis into a broader context or point your reader to next ideas. See our handout [Writing an Effective Conclusion](#) for more.

### a.i.4.a.i.1. **Summarize your argument**

Everything mentioned in your topic sentences should be mentioned here.

### a.i.4.a.i.2. **Last Sentence**

This should be a strong conclusion of relevance. Why is this paper important to the reader? To society? To the topic you covered?
